Bernie was born to Frank and Mary (nee Kallyn) Berg at home on the family farm near Pilger, SK. He attended Willing School for his education, making the trip to the one-room schoolhouse with several of his brothers and sisters. After finishing school, Bernie began working on the farm full-time. In the fall of 1965, he moved to Humboldt with his parents and brothers Martin and Steve. Bernie spent winters in Humboldt and the summer months he continued to farm the family homestead. He left for a season to work in a lumberyard in Prince George, BC, but returned back to his home to pick up farming. Bernie farmed alongside his brother Ted for several years and often had visits from his brother Martin and family. Bernie continued farming until the end, mowing the farmyard with his tractor the day before his passing. He also worked servicing plumbing and heating appliances and continued to help with plumbing issues for friends into his 80's. Bernie secured some land with his brother Mike in Northern Alberta and spent several years back and forth helping Mike get settled in there before he returned his focus to his Humboldt farm. He was always up for a road trip and enjoyed traveling throughout Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia usually to see family including brothers Frank and John, and sister Clara, as well as a chance to check out crops. Bernie's nieces and nephews also kept him busy with trips to the lake, mini-golf, berry picking or a tractor ride at the farm among other things. He was an active member of St. Augustine parish and his community supporting several local charities, especially if the fundraiser involved chocolate bars. Bernie spent several years square dancing and loved to attend dances around Saskatchewan. Later in life, he had a reliable schedule of coffee with his friend Fabian and regular card games and city trips with his friend Ed. Bernie was always happy to put on a suit for weddings and other festivities, but I'm sure that many will remember and miss seeing that familiar face around town in his signature coveralls and hardhat. We will all miss him dearly.

Bernie will be lovingly remembered and sadly missed by five brothers: Ted, Martin, John, Frank, and George; and by numerous nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by his parents; and by five brothers and four sisters: Frank Jr., Steve, Peter, Cecelia, Lucy, Victoria, Francis, Mike, and Clara
