As long as he was busy, he was happy. In his 70's, he retired and rented out his land. On August 9, 2011, Fred celebrated his 90th birthday on the farm. Two months later, he and Jean moved into Watson. An avid sports fan, in his younger years, Fred participated in baseball, hockey and curling, and then enjoyed watching sports on television. He also loved going on fishing trips throughout Saskatchewan. Fred belonged to the Canadian Order of Foresters, and was a faithful member of Trinity United Church in Watson. His greatest pride and joy was his granddaughters, who spent many summers with their grandparents.
